Exploring Interdependence as a Family - What we do matters to the whole

The Hidden Web

Beneath every forest floor is a vast hidden network called **mycelium** — tiny threads of fungi connecting tree roots underground. Scientists sometimes call it the “wood-wide web.” Through this network, trees share nutrients, send warning signals, and even support weaker neighbors.

A tree does not grow alone. A forest survives through connection.

When we honor **Interdependence** — the living web of all existence of which we are a part.

We remember:

- We are not separate from Earth.
- Every object has a story.
- Harm spreads — and so does repair.
- Care strengthens the whole.

Just like mycelium, our lives are connected in ways we cannot always see.

Follow the Threads

Supplies: Paper, markers or crayons, everyday object (shirt, apple, phone, bread, water bottle)

Draw or write the object in the center of the page. Then begin by asking:

Where did this come from? For example, if you choose a T-shirt: cotton farm → soil → rain → farmers → factory → sewing workers → shipping → truck drivers → store → you

Draw lines outward like mycelium threads and show all the inputs. Encourage drawing along the threads. Sun, rain, worms, farmers, truck drivers, store workers, family

For adults or older kids to add to the drawing:

- Who labored?
- What ecosystems were involved?
- What energy sources were used?
- What animals, plants, minerals were needed?

You will quickly see that your object is connected to hundreds — maybe thousands — of living beings.

When a Thread Is Strained - For older children and adults

After mapping the network, ask:

- Where might harm happen in this chain?
- Who might not be treated fairly?
- How might Earth be affected?
- Who benefits most?
- Who carries the cost?

What would repair look like?

Examples:

- Buying secondhand
- Choosing fair trade
- Reducing waste
- Supporting local makers
- Writing to companies
- Learning more before buying
- Learn more about effective recycling

Add new “repair threads” to your drawing in a different color.

1. What surprised you about this object’s journey?
2. What connections were invisible before?
3. How does knowing this change how you feel?
4. Where do you see beauty in interdependence?
5. Where do you see injustice?
6. What happens when one strand is damaged?
7. How are humans like trees in a forest?
8. How do justice and interdependence connect?
9. What surprised you about the web behind your object?
